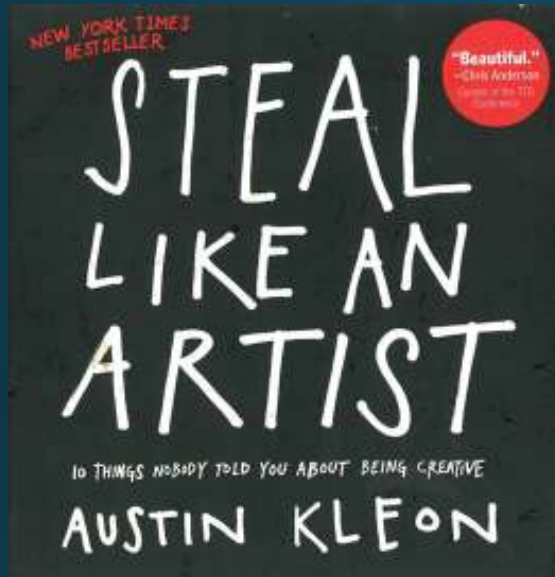

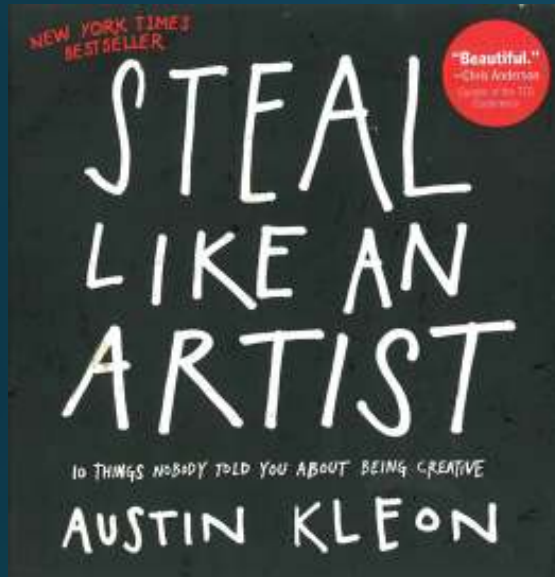

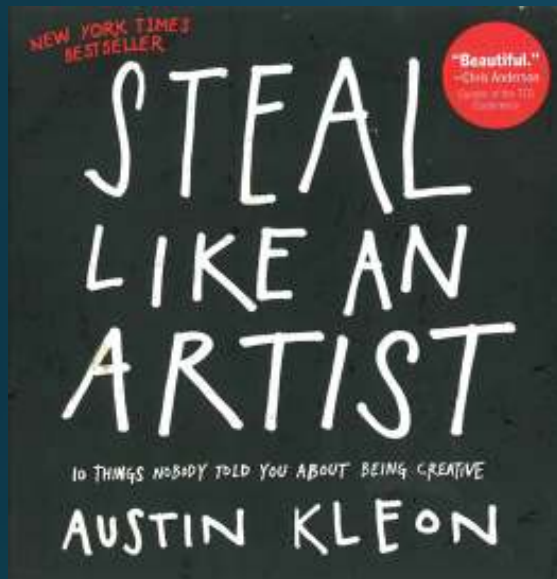

2014 MARGERUM RIVIERA ROSÉ

Nothing tastes more like summer in a glass than a breezy, refreshing rosé, and this aptly named Riviera Rosé will transport you straight to the South of France with one sip.

Produced by Santa Barbara's legendary restaurateur-turned-winemaker Doug Margerum, this pale pink-hued wine is surprisingly substantial for its shade, with aromas of strawberry and watermelon and an almost effervescent quality on the tongue.

Made primarily from grenache grapes sourced from San Luis Obispo and Santa Barbara counties, it pairs well with everything from mild cheeses to fish tacos to anything Provençal.

At 12.5 percent alcohol, it's the perfect wine to pour poolside, pack in your picnic basket or just enjoy on at sunset on the patio.
